Terry's support and encouragement as our Season Patron has assisted us in bringing back a number of our graduates, as directors, writers, designers, performers, devisers, and creators. Our former students bring their professional skills and experience to inspire our current students, and together they have worked hard to bring you an outstanding season of entertainment. If you are one of our former students, thank you for being part of the audience! Your support is an important piece in the success of our Drama program, and we are proud to have you join us.

## **Director's Note**

This is not a morality play. There is no villain, no hero, no moral to the story. This is just a little tale — some might call it an allegory – that will hopefully stir your heart and mind to help you reveal complexity, nuance, and understanding of your own world. This play is just an offer. What you choose to do with that offer is up to you. For me, Erin Shields' retelling of John Milton's 1667 epic poem of the same name offers a conversation between opposing ideas. Structure vs. anarchy. Or perhaps order vs. chaos. Or perhaps creation vs. destruction.

When I first read this play several years ago, it tickled my feminist sensibilities with a female Satan seeking to disrupt a patriarchal God... but at what cost to herself and her cause? Today, I find stronger resonances in contemporary activist culture, the fallen angels resembling any number of failed protestors who feel cast out, disempowered, and rejected. How many times in recent years have I heard my friends say about long-standing systems and structures of authority that the solution is simple: "Let's burn it all down!" It has become a war between those who seek to dismantle, defund, and abolish hierarchies (and the institutions in which they reside) and those who want to uphold traditions and peace even at the cost of individual freedoms. In many ways, these ideas actually become defined in opposition to each other, concepts that cannot exist except in relief to others. Dark becomes defined by the absence of light. Good is the absence of evil. Femininity is the absence of masculinity. Etcetera, etcetera...

I feel it every day. I work in theatre, a craft built on thousands of years worth of tradition and apprenticeship and on the conservation of ancient stories ...a form that is ALSO attempting to be modern, progressive, and radical! The pull between these values is constant. Half of this play is about gods and angels, but we humans – we "sons of Adam and daughters of Eve" to borrow a phrase – exist in the spaces between these competing ideas, our lives played out on the battlefield between these oppositions.

How are we to find balance, directing, and meaning amidst all that?

We look to stories.
