About the General Major in the Social Sciences	The General Major in the Social Sciences is designed to provide a broad major that supports the ideal of liberal education without sacrificing focus and depth unduly. Students are strongly encouraged to choose Social Science disciplines that are school subject areas or are taught in the provincial curriculum. A Co-op option, requiring three work terms, is available. Choosing an Education Major	The Faculty of Education offers 11 different majors that correspond to teaching subjects in Alberta schools (see p. 164 in the 2012/2013 University of Lethbridge Calendar for a listing). In highly competitive teaching majors, the GPA for admission may be above the minimum requirements.		
Choosing Courses Outside the Major	Students sometimes find that their initial objective to teach only at the elementary level or only at the secondary school level is later modified—or even completely changed. Students are therefore encouraged to select courses that will prepare them for teaching in a variety of situations. Moreover, students should select courses that not only provide breadth and richness for the classroom but also provide the basis for the development of a teaching minor or specialization.		
Choosing an Education Minor	The Faculty of Education offers 19 minors (see p. 169 in the 2012/2013 University of Lethbridge Calendar for a listing). A minor consists of five non-Education courses (excluding those used in the major) and one curriculum and instruction Education course (to be completed after admission to the Faculty of Education). Students may use the same courses to fulfill the minor and the General Liberal Education Requirement (GLER).		
Choosing an Education Specialization	 The Faculty of Education offers three specializations: Early Childhood Education (K-3) Special/Inclusive Education Technology in Education The specializations consist of four courses and corresponding Professional Semester III focus. 		
Advantages of Completing a Minor and/or Specialization	Completing a minor and/or a specialization allows students to develop expertise in a second area of teaching and be more versatile and marketable as a graduating teacher. Program	n Requirements	The B.A./B.Ed. Combined Degrees program with a General Major in the Social Sciences/Physical Education requires 50 courses, including 30 Arts and Science courses and 20 Education courses. Courses for the General Major in the Social Sciences will be chosen from three separate disciplinary streams or subject areas. Sixteen Arts and Science courses are required in the major.	
Disciplin	nary Streams	You are required to do seven courses in your first disciplinary stream, which must be Kinesiology (Physical Activity courses do not count towards this requirement). An additional four courses are required in each of yo remaining disciplinary streams. School subjects include Anthropology, Economics, Geography, History, Native American Studies, Political Science, and Sociology. Non-school subjects include Archaeology, Psychology and Women and Gender Studies. You may choose non-school subjects for these streams, but you should understant that the more school subjects you include in your General Major, the better prepared you will be to teach. Your 16th course will be a 'Quantitatively-based Methodology' course (statistics).

Terms Used

GLER course: A course that could count toward the General Liberal Education Requirement. You may use courses in your major towards this 12-course requirement. See the 2012/2013 University of Lethbridge Calendar, Part 4 - Academic Regulations (p. 90) for complete information.

The Faculty of Arts and Science offers Liberal Education 1000 and 2000, specifically designed to introduce first-year students to the wide scope of human knowledge and teach essential university success skills, critical thinking, and integrative thinking (see the 2012/2013 University of Lethbridge Calendar, Part 14 -Courses, p. 327). LBED 1000 and 2000 may be used toward satisfying the GLER.

Elective: A course that you may choose freely from all those available and applicable to your program. Use courses inside or outside your major, bearing in mind any restrictions that may apply (e.g., a maximum of 17 courses from any one department).
