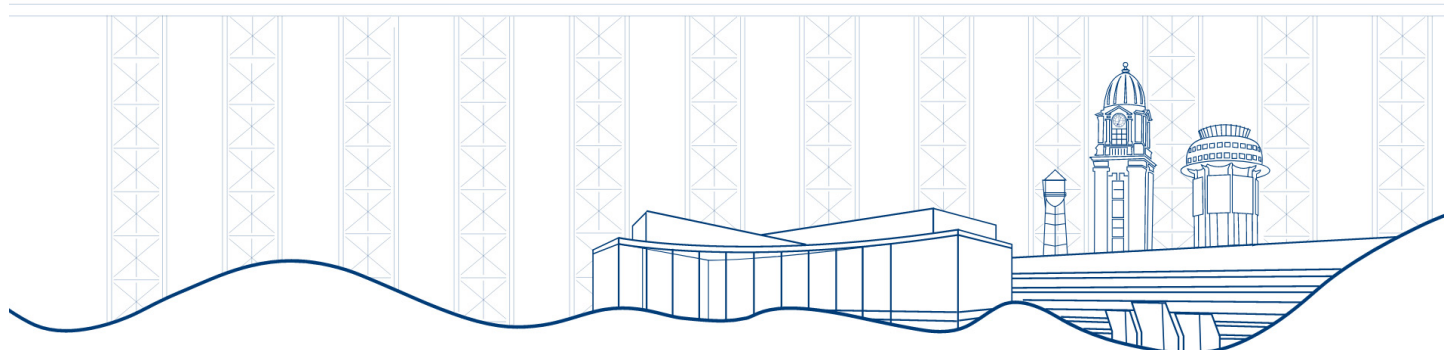

General Information

Students interested in a career in law may complete a program offered jointly by the University of Lethbridge, Faculty of Arts and Science, and Bond University, Faculty of Law, in Queensland, Australia. Students in this program complete the Canadian Law program at Bond University and are eligible to apply to practice law in Canada.

Within this dual degree program, students first complete 20 courses (60.0 credit hours) at the University of Lethbridge towards the B.A. Upon completion of a minimum of 20 courses (60.0 credit hours) at the University of Lethbridge, students are eligible to apply to Bond University for the LL.B. portion of the dual degree for the equivalent of 24 courses (72.0 credit hours or 240 credit points at Bond University) and subsequently return to complete an additional 10 courses (30.0 credit hours) at the University of Lethbridge to complete the program. Students will be awarded both degrees – B.A. from the University of Lethbridge and LL.B. from Bond University – upon completion of all the requirements at both universities.

Bond University Admission

Upon completion of a minimum of 20 courses (60.0 credit hours) with a cumulative GPA of 2.70 (calculated on all courses completed at the University of Lethbridge), students can apply to Bond for the LL.B. portion of the dual degree.

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Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) Requirements (U of L):

Liberal Education List Requirement

Only four courses (12.0 credit hours) in total may be counted from any one discipline toward the Lib Ed Requirement. Disciplines are identified by separate course subject codes. Cross-listed courses count toward the limit for both disciplines (e.g. IGBM 3250/INDG 3250 counts toward the limit for Dhillon School of Business courses and Indigenous Studies).

Only four courses (12.0 credit hours) in total from the Faculty of Education (EDUC), Faculty of Health Sciences (ADCS, HLSC, INHL, NURS, PUBH, and TREC), and the Dhillon School of Business (ACCT, AGEM, FINC, GLBU, HRLR, IGBM, MGT, and MKTG) may be counted towards the Lib Ed Requirement.

- _____ A maximum of three Independent Study courses (9.0 credit hours) may be completed for credit towards the degree.
- _____ A maximum of three Disciplinary Credit Applied Studies courses (9.0 credit hours) may be completed for credit towards the degree. Students may, in addition, complete Applied Studies 2000, 2001, 2010, and 2011.
- _____ A maximum of 17 courses (51.0 credit hours) may be completed from any one discipline for credit towards the degree. Disciplines are identified by a specific course label (e.g. KNES, ASTR, and HIST are separate disciplines).
- _____ A maximum of 6.0 credit hours in Activity courses (i.e. courses labelled PHAC and MUSE) may be completed for credit towards the degree, except for Kinesiology majors (not more than 15.0 credit hours).
- _____ A maximum of four courses (12.0 credit hours) from disciplines offered outside the Faculty of Arts and Science, Faculty of Fine Arts, or School of Liberal Education may be completed for credit towards the degree (i.e. labelled ACCT, ADCS, AGEM, CDEV, CRED, EDUC, FINC, GLBU, HLSC, HRLR, IGBM, INHL, MGT, MKTG, NURS, PUBH, and TREC). Courses cross-listed between the Faculty of Arts and Science and another Faculty or School do not count towards this limit.
- _____ Residence requirement: a minimum of 20 courses (60.0 credit hours) must be completed at the University of Lethbridge. At least half of the courses required in the major must be completed at the University of Lethbridge.

A **maximum** of 10 courses (30.0 credit hours) may be completed at the 1000 level (or lower) for credit towards the degree, excluding Activity courses (labelled PHAC and MUSE) and courses numbered in the range of 0520 to 0530.

¹ French 2010 and 2020 is the standard pattern; students who place into French 2020 will complete French 2020 and one additional senior French course; students who place directly into French 3010 will complete two additional senior French courses.
